Injury from arrow.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Instructor should hold relevant archery qualification. Maximum of four students to one instructor on the shooting line. The range must be set out with a clear shooting line and waiting area. Area behind and to the side of targets must be either a solid brick wall protected by a target net or to be marked as out of bounds. Warning signs put out as necessary. Group briefed to keep arrows pointing down the range at all times and not to cross the shooting line unless specifically told to do so by the Instructor. Group briefed on the meaning of 'Fast' or 'Stop' as a command and the importance of not distracting shooters. Group briefed on procedure for collecting arrows and the safe way to carry them. 		Instructor leading the session			
Injury from equipment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Visual check of equipment made by staff prior to each session. Damaged equipment taken out of use. Use of appropriate size/weight of bow and arrow length for individuals. 					

<p>Injury from collapsing target</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Target checked prior to use. Group briefed on correct removal of arrows from target. • Supervision by staff. 					
<p>Injuries to hands and arms from bowstring.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Briefing on correct fitting use of arm guards and finger tabs when used. • Correct shooting technique used. • Brief group not to draw or fire bow without an arrow. 					
<p>Physical contact with young person</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Archery GB state in their guidance that effective archery teaching is tactile. • Group to be made aware of this and to be given a full briefing on technique. • Staff to help students, touching them only as necessary on appropriate parts of their body eg. hands, arms, shoulders and in an appropriate manner. • Safeguarding guidelines to be followed. 					
<p>Slips trips and falls.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Safety briefing and identification of particular hazards. • Group warned not to run when on the archery range. 					
<p>Illness</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Staff should make themselves aware of existing medical conditions within the group. 			<p>Those with known allergies/conditions to have access to own inhaler, adrenalin autoinjector or appropriate medication</p>		
<p>Inappropriate behaviour</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Group briefing and management • Use of 'Sin Bin' facility or suspension of activity 					
<p>Safeguarding</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Group briefing and management. • Staff vigilance. • Visiting staff and participants to be aware of the tactile nature of effective archery teaching.
