RISK ASSESSMENT

Lea Green views the use of sheath knives as a tool to be used to meaningfully achieve or produce something. They are not simply given out to occupy time or to satisfy a desire to use a knife. The choice to allow individual participants to use a knife, and the way that knife is used reflects an appreciation of the participant's ability and developmental level. It should be borne in mind that the use of tools reflects taking supported risks, as well as the risk being balanced against the benefit the participant will glean from such use.

The use of a knife as a tool will be for such tasks as whittling a stick for it to be used to roast marshmallows, production of campsite items from natural materials and cooking. The use of sheath knives receives specific attention in Bushcraft competency training and assessment, and there are established 'tool talks' which are applied each time knives are to be used. The dynamic risk assessment of an individual participant's ability to use a knife and the way that knife is to be used rests with the Bushcraft practitioner and their professional judgement.
