Injury.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Instructors must hold an appropriate NGB or site specific accreditation. They must be aware of and comply with the centre operating procedures. Instructor must hold a current first aid certificate. First aid kit must be carried/accessible. Group size and ratios suitable for conditions and abilities. Group briefed on what to do in case of injury. Groups operating on their own to be briefed on emergency procedure and must carry a whistle. If appropriate instructor should have a record of which points they are visiting. Group to be briefed on hazards such as fences, posts, litter, broken glass, excrement etc. Instructor to brief group on moving safely through woods, taking care not to allow branches to flick back into the face of following group members. Group to be briefed to behave appropriately.

Ongoing risk assessment at start and during activity – weather conditions continually monitored. Equipment/clothing lists sent to groups.
